It is the hope of this class that our Annual may be an inspiration to succeeding classmen, challenging them to keep the ideals of our profession high.

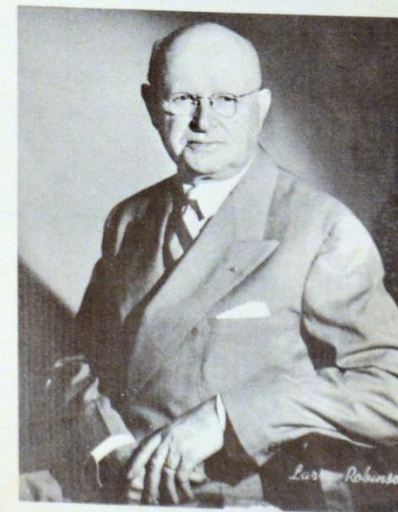

TRI-STATE SCHOOL OF NURSING

The Tri-State School of Nursing connected with Tri-State Hospital, was opened to students in 1925. Its purpose is to educate young women for professional Nursing careers, by providing an adequate program for the acquisition of scientific knowledge and a supervised clinical experience, resulting in technical skills and a better understanding of the whole patient, which includes contributory social factors, disease prevention and preservation of health.

The school offers a three year course, hence the first class was graduated in 1928. Since then two hundred and seventy-five students have passed through the portals of Tri-State School of Nursing to practice their profession as Registered Nurses.

Under the able leadership of Dr. J. C. Willis, Sr. and Dr. J. E. Knighton, Sr., the hospital grew from fifty beds to its present day hospital of one-hundred and fifty beds, now, it has out-grown this limited number of beds and plans are being discussed for a larger expansion of all departments.
