FOREWORD

The agitation about so-called "socialized medicine" has brought organized medicine, under the American system of free enterprise, to the forefront in the press and on the platform and radio of this country. History tells us that compulsory government insurance has, invariably, been the precursor of complete socialization of all other professions and of business in general.

Mr. Truman says his proposal is not "socialized medicine"; it is **only** government-controlled compulsory insurance. Other politicians have stated that they are opposed to socialized medicine; after election they still voice opposition to **that**, but say that they favor the Truman-Ewing plan of compulsory health insurance, controlled from Washington, "as it is not socialized medicine." Therefore, we feel that the "socialized medicine" term should be dropped and "socialized governmental compulsory health insurance" substituted therefor. To paraphrase a well known Shakespearean expression: "An onion under any other name would smell as bad."

As to cost of such a plan in this country, estimates vary as to amount of take-off it would cause in social security and other taxes, but the best estimate of the load which we have seen lately is in an editorial in New Orleans Times-Picayune of July 9, 1950; it stated that, in the various ways, the U. S. Government now spends approximately three billion dollars for public health and this cares for about one-sixth of the people of the nation. Therefore, complete coverage would cost taxpayers around \$18,000,000,000.00 per year. Just think of it—adding that much to present taxes and destroy the present system of caring for the sick and injured!

To quote from inaugural address of President E. L. Henderson of American Medical Association:

"American medicine, which has led the world in medical advances, and which has helped to make this the healthiest, strongest nation on the face of the globe, has been made the first major objective of those ambitious men in Washington who would make the American people walk in lockstep under a rigidly-controlled, Governmental-dominated economy.

"American Medicine—First Objective of the Socializers: The American medical system has been made a target for the barbs and criticisms of a comparatively small group of little men—little men whose lust for power is far out of proportion to their intellectual capacity, their spiritual understanding, their economic realism or their political honesty.

"These men of little faith in the American people propose to place all our people—doctors and patients alike—under a shabby, Government-dictated medical system which they call "Compulsory Health Insurance". And this, factually, is Socialized Medicine, regardless of how hard they try to disclaim it.

"BUT IT IS NOT JUST "SOCIALIZED MEDICINE" WHICH THEY SEEK; THAT IS ONLY THEIR FIRST GOAL.

"Their real objective is to gain control over all fields of human endeavor. Their real objective is to strip the American people of self-determination and self-Government and make this a Socialist State in the pathetic pattern of the socially and economically-bankrupt Nations of Europe which we, the American people, are seeking to rescue from poverty and oppression.

"THERE IS ONLY ONE ESSENTIAL DIFFERENCE BETWEEN SOCIALISM AND COMMUNISM. UNDER STATE SOCIALISM HUMAN LIBERTY AND HUMAN DIGNITY DIE A LITTLE MORE SLOWLY, BUT THEY DIE JUST AS SURELY!

"I think we will conquer infantile paralysis, arthritis, rheumatic fever, premature heart disease and high blood pressure.

"It is reasonable to expect that pneumonia, influenza, tuberculosis, the common cold and other infectious conditions will be reduced to an absolute minimum by new methods of prevention, control and treatment.

"And certainly the years ahead will bring a wealth of new knowledge concerning the human mind as well as the human body.

"WE ARE ON THE THRESHOLD OF GREAT PROGRESS WHICH WILL DO MUCH TO ALLEVIATE HUMAN SUFFERING AND TO PROLONG HUMAN LIFE. BUT IF WE ARE TO ACHIEVE THIS MAXIMUM PROGRESS IN THE FUTURE, WE MUST KEEP ALIVE THE AMERICAN SPIRIT AND THE AMERICAN METHODS WHICH HAVE MADE POSSIBLE THE PROGRESS OF THE PAST AND PRESENT!

"THIS IS THE SPIRIT, AND THESE ARE THE VERY METHODS, WHICH GOVERNMENT DOMINATION OF MEDICAL PRACTICE WOULD DESTROY!

"In behalf of American medicine, I want to express my deep appreciation of the wonderful support the medical profession has received from civic groups all over America in its fight for liberty."

With these thoughts in mind, we feel that the right-thinking people of our community will appreciate this history of a medical society, the membership of which has progressed during a non-socialistic regime and believe that all enterprises should continue free from socialism.

The task of preparing an accurate and concise history of Shreveport Medical Society is no easy one, in view of the fact that many early records have been lost or destroyed in fires and also due to various changes of name of the Medical organization which has had its headquarters in Shreveport for approximately a century.

While we cannot be really sure that 1949 or 1950 or later is the centennial year, which this volume commemorates, still there is evidence that the scattered early physicians of Northwest Louisiana were organization-minded as early as 1849.

With this brief "foreword," we shall present historical data, chronologically, in order that the present and future generations may be oriented on what has been done in the past by those who have preceded them.

It is hoped that our feeble efforts will be received with charitable understanding.

INTRODUCTION

We present herewith, chronologically, as far as possible, a history of the Shreveport Medical Society, the official society of Caddo Parish, which, as will be noted from excerpts from authorities, which will follow, began as The North Louisiana Medical Society. The records of this organization, as well as many of the Shreveport Medical Society, have been lost or destroyed by fire, so that we must depend upon write-ups by various authors for much of the early history; hence, it is our purpose to incorporate in this volume contributions to several old and recent publications to which we have secured access.

The earliest physician of whom we have record that settled in Shreveport was Dr. Ambrose Francis Clarke, a graduate of Medical College of Ohio in 1837, and who located here in 1840 or 1841, who left to enlist in the army for the Mexican War and, returning, became a member of organized medicine, dying in Shreveport in 1890.

The North Louisiana Medical Society became active in the fifties and was kept as a going concern until the outbreak of the Civil War; there were no meetings during the war between the states, as so many of our citizens, including doctors, volunteered for service in the Confederate army. However, after that conflict, it was recognized and met more or less regularly through the years, most of the members having served as surgeons in the Confederate army and were men of high professional ethics and keen foresight.

As far back as our memory serves us, the late Dr. F. E. Griffin, who, with his sons, has passed to the great beyond, was the secretary and his records, written in a beautiful hand and with fine diction, were preserved for many years, only to be lost by a secretary during the past 25 years; if these records were available, we could give a more thorough account of the early history. Amongst these pioneers were Drs. Clay, Compton, Egan, Sr. and Williams. The yellow fever of 1873, which was so devastating, again interrupted the work of the society, some of the physicians, notably Dr. Compton, being among the victims.

From Maude Hearn O'Pry's Chronicle of Shreveport:

"The medical society is, perhaps the most venerable organization in Shreveport, unless we except one or more of the churches. It has its origin away back in the 50's, and it was instituted in this city under the name of the North Louisiana Medical society. It comprised at that time, not only the local but physicians from various parishes and vicinity.

First President

"Dr. W. W. George (one time mayor and otherwise a builder) was its first president, and Drs. J. C. Egan (then of Bienville), R. A. Gray, T. J. Allen, Wise, Harper, and Gilpin were charter members.

"The second president was Dr. Bartholomew Egan, father of Dr. J. C. Egan, who was one of the most scholarly and accomplished members of his profession in the state.

"There was no change until 1861, so far as can be found out and no meetings were held it seems for four or five years. January 21, 1866, a meeting was held in which appear the names of Drs. Williams, Catlett, D. M. Clay, Beall, C. J. Bickham, J. F. Davis. It was then called the Shreveport Medical society. Dr. T. J. Allen was elected president; R. A. Gray vice-president and J. J. Bickham, treasurer (he went to New Orleans later). Fee bill was adopted. Visits in day were to be \$5, night \$10 and office practice \$2. Consultation \$20; obstetrical \$50; difficult \$100. The signers of this bill and the personnel at that time were: Drs. Allen, T. J. Williams, Gray, Bickham, Beall, Clark, Hotchkiss, Moore, Catlett, Cutliff, Davis, Clay, Crain, Turner and Taylor. The yellow fever epidemic caused a break in the record. Meetings were to be held daily but too busy to hold them.

Board of Health Need

The Shreveport Medical society, at an early date, called attention to the need of a city board of health and, together with other medical societies of the state, succeeded in having the legislature pass laws organizing this, as well as the state board of health and the Louisiana state board of medical examiners; the venerable Dr. J. C. Egan, then in his prime, served on both state boards and, later, became president of the Shreveport board of health, which office he held for many years.

Older residents of Shreveport today revere the memories of such men as Dr. J. C. Egan, Dr. R. A. Gray, Dr. D. M. Clay, Drs. D. H. and R. H. Billieu, Dr. J. J. Scott, Dr. L. H. Fisher, Drs. T. J. and J. W. Allen, Dr. A. A. Lyon, Dr. T. G. Ford, Dr. J. F. O'Leary, Dr. H. C. Coty, Dr. Randell Hunt, Dr. W. L. Dickson and many others who have, long since, passed to their rewards.

Some of the records of more recent days than those referred to above reveal the fact that our members were progressive and, without the modern means of fighting diseases, were of keen insight. Discussions in the records, which we have in our possession, from 1882 through 1893, reveal many interesting and surprisingly up-to-date discussions on medical, surgical and obstetrical subjects, which limited space will not permit us to quote.

History Written and Read by Dr. Frank Furman

on

December 1, 1925

The writer, when he was secretary of the Society in 1898, had access to an old minute book, compiled by Dr. J. E. Griffin, giving the history of the Society. Unfortunately, this book has been misplaced. So, much of the early history of the Society given here will be from memory of what the writer read in this book and the incidents related by the older physicians.

Among the first settlers of Shreveport and the surrounding country were a number of physicians, many of whom had amassed considerable fortunes and had come to Louisiana to engage in planting, intending to discontinue practice, but in some instances, on account of the need for their services, they consented to attend their neighbors.

The personnel of this Society was very high, most of the members had served as surgeons in the Confederate Army, and it has been my privilege to hear some of these gentlemen tell of the trying conditions under which they were compelled to work.

The members of the Society were typical Southern gentlemen, punctilious to a point and very careful observers of the ethics of their profession.

The old book to which I have alluded tells of a controversy between Drs. Clay and Compton on the floor at one of the meetings. This controversy led to a challenge being given and accepted, but before the antagonists could meet the city was visited by the yellow fever epidemic of 1873, and when the epidemic had spent itself, Dr. Compton was among the dead. The writer knew Dr. Clay well, and it was characteristic of the man and of the type to which he belonged that he never spoke of Dr. Compton except in terms of the highest praise.

During this early period the minutes show that the Shreveport Medical Society was always active in promoting any movement for the advancement of the profession and for the improvement of the sanitary conditions of the city and state.

The Society called attention at an early date to the need of a City Board of Health. Together with the other medical societies of this state, a movement was inaugurated to pass a law creating a State Board of Medical Examiners and one of the members of the Shreveport Medical Society, Dr. J. C. Egan, was a member of the first Board of Medical Examiners.

The Society also endorsed the pure food and drug laws and sent numerous letters to the Senators of Louisiana and the Representatives from this district, urging them to support such measures.

The law creating a State Board of Health was also supported by this Society, and the present law is greatly due to the efforts of Dr. J. C. Egan of Shreveport and Dr. Edmond Souchon of New Orleans.

Shreveport has passed through three severe yellow fever epidemics, the last being in 1873. In every instance the physicians did their full duty, and many gave their lives in that service.

Soon after the Civil War a private infirmary was founded by Drs. Williams and Clay. During the Yellow Fever epidemic of 1873, a prostitute of the city gave her house, which was used by the Howard Association as a hospital. A State Hospital was founded later and located in a ten acre lot north of the city, beyond what is now Garden Street.

The Doctors Allen also owned an infirmary in a group of log houses at the corner of Market and Travis Streets.

The Charity Hospital was served by a visiting surgeon and a resident who was sometimes a physician and sometimes a medical student and from two to four interns who were medical students.

The writer served as an intern in the Charity Hospital in 1889 and 1890. Dr. Clay was then visiting surgeon. At that time there was a frame house having four large rooms, a kitchen and a dispensary. The students occupied one room, one room was used for white women and one for negro women and one for an operating room. There were two long log houses on each side of the main building, one for white men and one for negro men. The nursing was done by the students, a negro man and convalescing patients. While there was no visiting staff the physicians of the town frequently came out to the hospital with the surgeon. An excellent custom, which I regret to say has fallen into disuse, was that of serving the visiting surgeons with a toddy upon their arrival at the hospital, another was usually served just before every operation and a third before they left.

The Charity Hospital was moved from the old site to the present one in 1890 into a frame building.

Dr. T. E. Schumpert was House Physician in 1893, later he became surgeon in charge and attained an eminent position as a surgeon. He founded the Shreveport Sanitarium about 1898, and upon his death left a sum of money to the T. E. Schumpert Memorial Sanitarium.

It was under Dr. Randall Hunt's administration that a visiting staff to the hospital was appointed. It was during this administration that the present brick building was completed.

Perhaps the most eminent figure in the Shreveport Medical Society in the early days was Dr. J. C. Egan. He was a physician of ability and a citizen whose services to his state, while invaluable as a physician and sanitarian, were equally important in other fields.

Dr. Egan was born in Virginia and moved to Louisiana some years before the Civil War. He probably performed the first laparotomy in North Louisiana when he operated for extra-uterine pregnancy shortly before or after the Civil War and was in command of the Hospitals of the Trans-Mississippi Department. Upon the close of the War, Dr. Egan returned to Mount Lebanon, Louisiana, to practice his profession, and he took an active part in liberating the state from carpet bag rule. During that period he served in the Legislature. The late Col. D. F. Boyd, for many years president of the Louisiana State University, said that it was due to Dr. Egan's initiative and management that negroes were kept out of the University at this time and a separate school was established for them. When a white government was finally established and his services no longer needed, Dr. Egan retired from politics and removed to Shreveport where he became very active at once in the practice of medicine and in all matters pertaining to public health.

Shreveport Medical Society held its meetings in 1895, in Allen's Infirmary, corner Market and Travis, first Tuesday each month, and the officers were: Dr. A. A. Lyon, president; Dr. J. C. Calloway, vice-president; Dr. J. E. Griffin, recording secretary; Dr. Randall Hunt, corresponding secretary; Dr. J. J. Scott, treasurer; all of whom have passed away, although many who were members at this time are still active in this splendid organization.

Dr. Egan was influential in organizing both the City Board of Health and the State Board of Health and the last years of his life were spent as president of the City Board of Health. During the last years of his incumbency in this office, New Orleans and other nearby cities suffered from yellow fever. A detention camp and a mosquito proof emergency hospital were located just outside the city limits. These were under Dr. G. C. Chandler, and while several cases of yellow fever were taken

off the trains, no case developed in the city.

For some years before 1905, Dr. Egan had earnestly advocated a city ordinance requiring the destruction of mosquito breeding places. During this year these laws were put into effect. Dr. Egan was at this time more than 90 years old and he retired, and died a few years later. From 1905 the growth of the city has been rapid and many excellent private hospitals have been enlarged or built. During that time the Board of Health has been efficiently handled.

During Dr. G. C. Chandler's administration of the Health Office a campaign to destroy breeding places of the housefly was inaugurated, and Dr. Chandler was very insistent in urging a better source of water supply for the city, an accomplishment that has just been realized.

During the World War the Shreveport Medical Society contributed a generous quota of its members to the Medical Corps of the Army.

I have studiously refrained from mentioning the services of any living

members of the Society, but I cannot close a paper of this kind without some mention of the Dean of the Medical Profession in Shreveport, Dr. J. F. O'Leary. Dr. O'Leary served when a boy in the Confederate Army and studied medicine after the War. After practicing for some years in northeast Louisiana, he came to Shreveport in 1883, where he at once identified himself with the Society. Shortly after he came to Shreveport a number of cases of small pox developed in the city and Dr. O'Leary is still actively engaged in the practice of medicine among us. Some years ago the writer heard an anecdote taken from a book of Civil War reminiscences in which it was stated that Dr. O'Leary had conducted himself with conspicuous gallantry on one occasion. The writer had never heard Dr. O'Leary mention this incident, neither had any of his friends in the medical profession, even the Doctor's son had never heard of it, but upon his asking his father learned that it was true. Such is this man, capable of doing a heroic act and then, rarer still, incapable of bragging about it.

A History of the Shreveport Medical Society

Shreveport was incorporated in 1837, but the town was merely an outpost at the head of navigation of Red River for many years, and it was not until the decade between 1840 and 1850 that the settlement of Northwest Louisiana became more than a few isolated plantations in widely separated localities.

At about this period, the first body of medical men to meet in North Louisiana met in Shreveport and organized the North Louisiana Medical Society with Dr. Bartholomew Egan of Mt. Lebanon as president. The name of this society was changed to the Shreveport Medical Society and meetings were held at more or less regular intervals until the outbreak of the Civil War, when many of the members entered the Confederate Army.

Upon the close of the Civil War, the Shreveport Medical Society was reorganized, and monthly meetings were held. The regular meetings of the society were interrupted in 1873, when Shreveport suffered from an epidemic of yellow fever that was more devastating to the city than the Civil War had been. Many members of the Society died of the disease but on account of the loss in population, the doctors who survived, appear to have been sufficient for the needs of the community for there were no accessions to the Society till after 1880.

After the cessation of the yellow fever epidemic of 1873, the Medical Society began to meet again regularly and had continued to do so up to the present time. Books of minutes and a history of the Shreveport Medical Society were compiled by Dr. J. E. Griffin about 1890. Unfortunately

these have been lost, so that I have relied for my data on memory.

This history showed that from the beginning, the Shreveport Medical Society took an active and leading part in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the community and inaugurated or advanced all legislative matters pertaining to sanitation. Together with the other medical societies of the state, the Shreveport Medical Society was active in having a law passed creating a State Board of Medical Examiners and a State Board of Health.

During one of the early epidemics of yellow fever when Shreveport was still a frontier town, a prostitute converted her house into an emergency hospital and became for the time being a nurse. This was the first hospital in Shreveport; a few years later, the State established the Shreveport Charity Hospital.

In 1889, when I was an intern in this hospital, it was housed in a frame house having four large rooms and a kitchen, one bedroom for the interns, one an operating room, a room for white women patients and one for negro women. There were two log houses, one for negro men and one for white men. The nursing was done by a negro man and one woman assisted by the convalescing patients. Dr. D. M. Clay was surgeon in charge. There was no visiting staff, but the doctors of the town frequently came out with the visiting surgeon.

An excellent custom, which I regret to say has fallen into disuse, was that of serving a toddy to the visiting surgeons upon their arrival and another before they left.

The Doctors Allen had an infirmary in an old log house in the city, these were the only hospitals in Shreveport prior to 1890.

Perhaps the most eminent figure in the Shreveport Medical Society in the early days was Dr. J. C. Egan. He was born in Virginia and moved to Louisiana some years before the Civil War. Dr. Egan probably performed the first laparotomy in North Louisiana when he operated for extra-uterine pregnancy, immediately before or after the Civil War. He entered the service of the Confederate Army at the outbreak of the Civil War and was in command of the hospitals of the Trans-Mississippi Department. Upon the close of the war, Dr. Egan returned to Mt. Lebanon. During the reconstruction period he served in the legislature. The late Col. D. F. Boyd, for many years president of the Louisiana State University, said that it was due to Dr. Egan's initiative and management that negroes were kept out of the University at this time and a separate school was established for them.

When a white government was finally established and his services no longer needed, Dr. Egan retired from politics and removed to Shreveport

where he became very active in the practice of medicine and all matters pertaining to public health. He was a member of the first Board of Medical Examiners and resigned from that to become a member of the State Board of Health.

One of the most conspicuous services that he rendered to his city as well as his last, was his service in inaugurating a campaign to rid the city of mosquitoes. Although nearly 90 years of age, Dr. Egan accepted the theory of transmission of yellow fever by the mosquito. In 1905, there were many cases of yellow fever brought to Shreveport from nearby towns and were treated in an emergency hospital especially prepared for the treatment of these cases. This hospital was under the management of Dr. G. C. Chandler. There was no spread of the disease in the city, owing to the efficiency of the mosquito campaign.

Dr. Egan retired from practice in 1905 and died a few years later. The society has continued to flourish during this century and upon this country entering the world war furnished a generous quota of its members to the medical corps of the army and navy.

STATE SOCIETY

When a move was started by Dr. Egan of Shreveport, together with Drs. Chaille, Bemiss and Richardson of New Orleans to organize a state medical society in 1878, the move met with success in having it established in 1879 with Dr. J. C. Egan as its first president and in 1882, Dr. A. A. Lyon was elected to this office, which illustrates the influence of the Shreveport members. Since then, seven members of our local society have been thus honored.

In the realm of surgery, Shreveport has always stood high. In the early days of the Shreveport society, much good work was performed at the old Charity hospital, at "Moss Side park", by such men as Drs. Gray, Ashton and Randolph. Later, when its location was changed to the present site on Texas Avenue, with the old frame building, Dr. T. E. Schumpert (a pioneer in modern surgery), Dr. Randell Hunt, Dr. R. H. Gray, Dr. G. B. Lawrason, Dr. I. M. Calloway and others carried on progressive work. These, with Drs. Louis Abramson and J. C. Willis carried forward the torch of surgical success. The late Dr. J. C. Egan was fond of telling how he operated upon and successfully drained many appendiceal abscesses during the Civil War, long before the ailment had a name.

The Shreveport Medical society has made enormous strides since the "turn

of the century." Compared with an enrollment of 25 in 1884, there were 60 members in 1910, the number increasing every year until there are now 190 or more doctors participating. Although this organization is the official society of Caddo parish, out of respect for some of the older members, the name has never been changed to indicate its full membership, although such a move has been proposed several times.

Shreveport, the medical center of Ark-La-Tex has a fine array of medical and surgical talent with great hospital facilities; besides five private general hospitals, three tuberculosis hospitals, Shriner's hospital for crippled children and the present state Charity Hospital, there is, in the offing the large Veterans' hospital, now half completed, and the new Charity hospital, on a modern scale, work on which has been begun.

The Shreveport Medical society has never had a permanent home, although committees for that purpose have been appointed for the past 15 or 20 years. At present, the usual meeting places are the Board of Health auditorium, the Louisiana State Exhibit building and Charity Hospital. Now, the state Charity hospital authorities have assured the organization that a permanent home may be counted on in the new institution, when constructed, library facilities also to be provided.

Not long ago a single volume in which were recorded the minutes of the Shreveport Medical Society (1882-1893) was brought to Dr. S. C. Barrow by a layman who recognized its historic value. The subject matter proved so interesting to me that I have attempted to weave it into a sequence in the hope that the members of this Society might share the pleasures which I have enjoyed while perusing its pages.

In order that these medical pioneers who have voiced their ideas, theories, and experiences as recorded in this volume to which I have referred, might be more thoroughly understood and appreciated. I thought it not amiss to review the medical and civic background of these members of our profession who have long since passed from their sphere of usefulness, but whose indomitable will, civic virtues, and professional efforts have paved the way for us today. The science of medicine as we all are aware is but a succession of trials and failures. Facts today are but fiction tomorrow. If we smile with benevolent indulgence upon these men, let us not forget that future generations will feel the same toward us.

In 1882 when this story begins, the Civil War had ended only sixteen years previously. Every member of the Society had either seen actual combat service or else served as a medical officer of the Confederate Army. There

is no better evidence of this than the not infrequent reference to war service.

It was less than two decades before that Lister had given his antiseptic theory to the profession. Thermometers were large and bunglesome. The hypodermic syringe was just coming into general use. General anaesthesia (chloroform only) was new. Local anaesthesia was unknown. Aside from morphine and strychnine there were practically no alkaloids for hypodermic medication. The microscope was only a scientific curiosity. The X-ray was not even dreamed of by the wildest dreamer. Hospitals were poorly organized; trained nursing was unheard of. Sanitation was the very crudest. There was no system of water works. It was truly the "horse and buggy" era, but roads and streets were so poorly constructed and even more poorly cared for that the greater part of the year it was the horse alone that carried the good doctor on his weary way.

But even under these handicaps it is to the honor and pride of our profession that these medical ancestors met not infrequently and exchanged ideas, reported and discussed cases, and carried high the torch of medical organization and medical ideals.

While some of the records are hard to read, the records of J. W. Allen, secretary 1881-1883 and A. A. Lyon,

secretary 1885-1886 and 1888-1890 inclusive, and again in 1890, show evidence of extreme care both in orthography and recording of discussions.

The following names appear on the roster of membership which has been preserved for 1882, 1885, and 1892:

In 1882 there were 24 members of the Society. In 1892, 25 names appear on the list of membership. There were never more than seven or eight in attendance. Drs. T. J. Allen, J. W. Allen, T. G. Ford, J. C. Egan, A. A. Lyons and J. J. Scott attended practically every meeting. The rest came occasionally. From 1882 through 1883 the Society met on alternate months in the offices of Drs. Allen and Lyons. After 1883 the Society met regularly at the Drs. Allens' offices. The Allens' office and infirmary was situated where the present Sinclair Building stands. This was among the first if not the first private hospital in Shreveport, although I have been told without verification, that a Dr. Williams whose name does not appear on the roster, in the 70's had a private sanitarium where the Hearne Dry Goods Building now stands. During this period of years there appeared to be, from the records, a feeling of true fraternal friendship and a spirit of comradeship and tolerance as evidenced by the free and frank discussions.

In 1890 insurrection appeared in the ranks as evidenced by an attempt to change the meeting place. A committee which was appointed disapproved any change. The words of Dr. T. J. Allen, which I quote verbatim from the minutes, give an insight of just what was going on. "Dr. T. J. Allen with his characteristic suavity remarked that the Society had always been welcome at the infirmary, that it would be a pleasure for him to continue its meetings in the future, but if the members desired otherwise he would doff his hat and gracefully bow in submission."

But the "apple of discord" had done its work for the Society began to drag. From June 1891 to February 1892 the minutes report "no quorum." On March 1, 1892, the Society after various and repeated failures was at last honored with a quorum. Each

notice of this meeting stated that officers were to be elected and "I suppose that a number were attracted by the hopes of being among the honored". After a rather spirited contest according to the secretary, Dr. Randall Hunt was elected president. The secretary noticed "with sorrow that Dr. Hunt in the excess of his joy forgot the returning board and gathered his hat and stole quietly away to smile alone (alone underscored) and to

Some Highlights

Regulating the practice of medicine. The society met June 10, 1882, to consider Dr. Buffinton's bill before the legislature to regulate the practice of medicine. Dr. T. J. Allen moved that the Society endorse the bill. Dr. J. C. Egan said that the provisions were inadequate and that he would not vote for the resolution. "After a (rather) long discussion in which every one took some part the society adjourned without action." This bill was finally endorsed into law and became the first real legal regulation of medicine practice in Louisiana.

First Parish Medical Society: On May 1, 1883, under the head of new business, Dr. Lyon read the following resolution: "Whereas this Society recognizes the importance of thorough organization of the medical profession of the State and whereas this object can only be accomplished by a system of subordinate parish societies in affiliation with the State Society, therefore be it resolved that the Shreveport Medical Society take immediate steps to organize, if possible, the members of the regular profession of the parish of Caddo into a society for the purpose of affiliating with the organization as provided by the Constitution of the State Society. As the means to this end be it resolved that a committee be appointed to issue a call to the physicians of the parish of Caddo to meet in the City of Shreveport on Saturday, June 2, at 12 o'clock for the purpose aforesaid." Carried. Drs. Lyon, Egan and Ford

gass near Tomb's cigar stand, before we adjourned." There is no record in future minutes that this unusual outburst was ever disapproved. Dr. Hunt had defeated the venerable Dr. J. C. Egan, Will's father, for the presidency. The records fail to show that Dr. Hunt presided at a single meeting following his elevation to the presidency. The following year Dr. J. C. Egan was elected president unanimously, and things began to run smoothly again.

were appointed by the Chair on this committee. At the next meeting of the Society the committee reported that the parish society had been organized. Dr. Wylie was made the first president, but the society never functioned.

Counter Prescribing: November 6, 1883, Dr. Ashton offered the following resolution: "Resolve that the Shreveport Medical Society address a communication to the Druggists of Shreveport requesting them to discontinue prescribing from the counter and refilling prescriptions without an order from the physician," T. H. Morris & Co. (now Morris & Dickson) answered the resolution, but unfortunately the minutes read "The communication of T. H. Morris & Co. before referred to, was presented, read and ordered filed without further action at present."

State Board of Health: Under the head of new business on May 8, 1884, Dr. J. C. Egan presented the following: "Resolved that this Society in the preparation of a bill for creating a Board of Health for the State of Louisiana holds that local boards of health should have independent jurisdiction in all matters of quarantine and sanitation." The State Board of Health was first established in 1858. At first it appeared from the contents of the resolution that the Board of Health was just being organized. Evidently an effort was being made to improve the existing statutes.

Election of Cleveland: On November 4, 1884, no meeting was held. "The town was in a whirl of excitement over the election news, Cleveland and Hendricks being uppermost in the medical mind of Shreveport at the hour of meeting."

Shreveport Charity Hospital. The respect and confidence in which the medical profession was held by the citizenry is well attested by the following letter:

Dr. W. S. Ashton, President,
S. M. S., Dec. 19, 1884.

Dear Sir:

At the last session of the legislature of the State an appropriation of \$20,000 was secured by our legislators for the specific purpose of erecting a permanent hospital building in this city. Plans and specifications for said building were legally advertised for and are now in the hands of the Shreveport Charity Hospital Board.

It is the especial wish of the members of the Board that said plans be submitted to the members of the medical profession of Shreveport, and as you are the President of the Shreveport Medical Society would respectfully request that you convene that honorable body at the earliest practical period so that the matter can be fully discussed and your opinion presented in an official manner. Trusting a reply, I am, Respectfully yours, etc., S. Levy, Jr., President of Board.

Of the several plans submitted the plans of O. P. Law, Marshall, Texas, were recommended by the Society for the following reasons:

1. With ample ventilation it has compactness of structure thus insuring less expense for repair.
2. It provides wards for infectious and contagious diseases disconnected from the main building with service window from the kitchen

thereby avoiding contact with the other attaches.

3. The economic arrangement for nurses adjacent to wards with kitchen and living apartments.
4. Pay ward with nurses ward adjacent to bath rooms.
5. The convenient location of the operating room which is also supplied with sky light and windows and access through closed corridors from any portion of the building.
6. The location of the water closets and bath houses.
7. The convenience of the administration part of the building which adds to the efficiency and economy.
8. The appropriate appearance and elegant exterior of the building with which is combined the most advanced ideas of hospital hygiene and sanitation.

January, 1885: On motion of Dr. T. G. Ford the recording secretary was excused from the payment of dues.

In as much as considerable difficulty was being experienced in securing essayists, the eight members present pledged themselves each to write one essay during the ensuing year. This is mentioned for the reason that while many cases were freely discussed, time after time the minutes showed where doctors were excused from presenting essays generally because of lack of time. When one stops to consider the means of transportation, etc., more than fifty years ago, the excuses can be readily understood as legitimate.

Under the head of new business, the election of delegates to the La. State Society and the A. M. A. to meet in N. O. April 21 and 28, 1885, resulted in the choice of T. J. Allen and D. H. Billieu to the La. State Society and J. C. Egan and D. H. Billieu to the A. M. A. A few meetings later the delegates were reimbursed by the Society for their actual expenses of the trip.

That election night drew the largest crowd then as it does now is well attested by the following resolution introduced by Dr. Ashton: "Resolved that the constitution be so amended as to prohibit any member from voting at the annual meeting for the election of officers who have not attended at least four regular meetings during the current year and that no member shall be entitled to vote who is in arrears with his dues to the Society."

The world goes round and round.

In 1886 Dr. R. H. Day of Baton Rouge attempted to enlist the support of the Shreveport doctors in the organization of The Physicians Mutual Benevolent Association. No action was taken and the idea evidently died aborning.

May 1888, Dues: Evidently the Society was having some trouble about dues as is indicated by the following resolution: "Resolve that the by-laws indicating \$1.00 as the tax for quarterly dues be so amended as to read, 'the quarterly dues of this society shall be 25 cents'. That they were 'resolving' that night is further attested by the following. 'Resolve that hereafter this Society shall not assume the expenses of its delegates to meetings of other societies.'" "Resolved that in the future this Society shall adjourn at 9:45 P. M. unless decided otherwise by a three-fourths vote of members."

A special meeting was held June 9, 1888, at which the following resolutions were adopted: Resolved, that it is the sense of this Society that it does not commend either the language or the spirit of the article referred to. While we admit the ability of our critics, we cannot but regret that their exalted genius and talents have not been directed to the building up rather than the pulling down of a Society of which they themselves are presumed to be prominent members, though on this particular occasion it was unhappily true that not one of the EIGHT composing the editorial staff was present

While we are pained to note that great room for improvement does exist, and that our State Society has not yet attained the stand to which it is entitled and is capable of reaching, if only an energetic cooperation of the profession throughout the State, and ESPECIALLY in the great city of New Orleans, could be secured, yet we feel nevertheless, that the article in question is not just; it is ill-timed and unwise. It is calculated to lower us in the estimation of our brethren abroad, and certainly does not tend to stimulate or unify us at home; and coming as it does from a journal that has received many favors from the Society, appears to us especially objectionable.

To the editorial staff of the Journal, among whom we recognize some of the earliest and staunchest friends of the Society, we would modestly suggest that to characterize a regular annual meeting of the State Medical Society as marked by "idleness and slipshod irresponsibility, that have for years made the Medical Society of Louisiana a disgrace to the State," "as the straggling together in some locality of a dozen or so of languid, inconsequent medical men, etc., etc.," is not respectful, indeed is very censurable language, notwithstanding it emanates from a source so high as the Journal aforesaid. Should we not rather cultivate the "things that make for peace" and be on our guard, lest our Society be "wounded in the house of its friends?"

Resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be transmitted to the various medical societies of the State, and that a copy also be sent to the New Orleans Medical and Surgical Journal with request to publish.

The Society evidently was all "het up" as the resolutions were in printed form and the report was unanimously adopted. The occasion for the resolutions

was an editorial in the June number of the New Orleans Medical and Surgical Journal, severely criticising the Louisiana State Medical Society and especially its late session at Monroe.

In October, 1889, Dr. D. M. Clay, the first surgeon of the Charity Hospital, passed away. The Society at a special meeting adopted respectful resolutions. Dr. Clay, being an outstanding member of the profession, the committee was in a mood to "spread it on thick" praising his many civic, professional, and social virtues. I quote one paragraph that especially struck me: "Dr. Clay was a medical man that never cheapened or lowered his calling by underrating a professional service or by neglecting to insist upon adequate compensation with reasonable promptness."

In 1888 Dr. Randall Hunt was elected to membership. In 1893 Dr. T. E. Schumpert became a member, and in the same year Rawley Penick was a welcome visitor.

Homeopath Consultation and Advertising: June 13, 1893, the following resolutions were adopted, and so far as I know have never been rescinded. "Resolved that any member of this Society who may consult with a homeopath or any other 'irregular' in the practice of medicine or any member who may advertise or put in the paper (daily or weekly) anything relative to his practice except a plain business card with the title he received from a regular chartered college or any member who may claim to be a specialist and shall so advertise himself—calling attention to himself as a specialist shall be considered as having voluntarily excluded himself from the regular profession and shall be expelled from the Society and be debarred from consultation with any of its members."

I could keep on indefinitely with various quotations that would give you an insight into the workings of the medical minds of the day, but I must be on as I wish to take up what to all of us might be more interesting—the

discussion of diseases and their treatment.

DISEASES AND THEIR TREATMENT

As evidence of the wide range of subjects discussed during this decade, I have listed the following:

1882—Fracture of hip, lead colic, syphilis, amputations, malaria fever, rheumatism, salivary calculus.

1883—Gunshot wound of knee, mole skin plaster splints, urethrotomy, cervicitis, hermaphrodite, vesicovaginal fistula, sloughing scrotum, broncho-pneumonia, treatment of burns, dysentery, cerebral hemorrhage.

1884—Treatment of small pox, bovine vs. human vaccine, heart disease in pregnancy, pelvic abscess, dengue, angina pectoris, coal tar asphyxia.

1885—Traumatic meningitis, cerebral concussion, bladder infection, ophthalmia neonatorum, croup and diphtheria, pseudo enteritis, amputations, placenta praevia, skull fracture with paralysis, oedema of auditory canal, convulsions in children rotheln, lithotomy.

1886—Compound fracture of arm, antiseptic treatment of wounds, fracture of femur, pneumonia, whooping cough, cancer of tongue, cancer of uterus, purpura hemorrhagica, perityphilitic abscess.

1887—Asiatic cholera, hemorrhage, apoplexy, gunshot wound of the abdomen.

1888—Poison from tincture of aconite and carbolic acid, phenacetine.

1889—Hysteria, malaria, hematuria, psoasabscess, congestion, cause of malaria, compound fracture of thigh, Charpin antiseptic, poison from Fowler's Solution, scarlet fever, coma, mental aberration, emotional insanity, malaria fever, typhoid fever.

1890—Puerperal septicemia, puerperal eclampsia, hepatic phlebotomy, abdominal wall incision, pleurisy with effusion, empyema, alcoholics, carbolic acid, non-rotation of head.

1891—Gunshot wound of abdomen, progressive muscular atrophy, cerebral sclerosis, dry gangrene, dislocated vertebrae, disseminated sclerosis, cystitis, antikamia, aneurism of gluteal artery, nevus, "dry tetter."

1892—Puerperal convulsions, malignant diphtheria, cystic tumor of back.

1893—City water supply, malaria hematuria, infections from hypodermic, skin grafting, diabetes, trachoma, pernicious anemia, locomotor ataxia, tubercular meningitis.

Syphilis—1882: Dr. Ashton believed that syphilis was modified by race, climate and habit, that chancroid and syphilis were two distinct conditions. Dr. Ford agreed with the essayist, but Dr. Lyon had not made up his mind whether or not he was a "dualist."

Broncho-pneumonia: Dr. Lyon used quinine and aconite and liquid ammonia acetate in broncho-pneumonia, but did not believe quinine an antipyretic. Dr. T. J. Allen was of the opinion that cinchonidia was. All agreed that quinine was an antiperiodic. Upon Dr. O'Leary asking the dose of cinchonidia, Dr. Lyon replied that it was $\frac{1}{2}$ to one-third more than quinine.

Small-pox: Dr. O'Leary believed that cathartics were objectionable. He used digitalis 5 drops, zinc sulfate gr. $\frac{1}{4}$ q. 4 hrs., and claimed that it dwarfed the eruption. He also administered acetic and carbolic acid four-five gts. with laudanum q. 4 hrs. He reported a pregnant woman who had recovered. Young children generally stood the disease better than adults. Death was due to

suppuration, exhaustion, eye infection, and kidney disease. He reported one case that had died before the eruption appeared. Dr. Lyon was of the opinion that thick oily skins pitted more than thin dry skins. His arrangement was that the thick skin formed a nidus for the eruption poison. Dr. T. J. Allen disagreed with Dr. Lyon. He thought age the most important factor. Dr. Lyon agreed with Dr. Allen that age was a factor, but still stuck to his "guns." Dr. Clay did not believe that vaccine protected as well as it formerly did when humanized vaccine was used. This brought on a long discussion which finally drifted into the relative potency of Dr. Mortya's (Boston) and the French Bourgeancy virus. Upon Dr. O'Leary inquiring when the vaccine was protective, Dr. T. J. Allen, on the authority of Dr. Mitchell of Philadelphia, believed it effective from the first day.

Pelvic tumor: Dr. Walter Allen reported a large pelvic tumor which felt like a fibroid. The patient developed peritonitis from which she recovered with the disappearance of the tumor.

Croup and diphtheria—1885: Dr. T. J. Allen was of the opinion these two diseases were distinct although most of others considered them the same. He believed diphtheria due to a germ. (Klebs 1883, Loeffler 1884, although not mentioned were known to medicine). Drs. Egan, Billieu, Hilliard, Ashton, Ford and J. W. Allen all believed diphtheria to be contagious. Dr. Egan saw his first case in 1850, others in 1860 and 1867. Dr. Ashton thought that the two diseases were sometimes hard to differentiate. Dr. Hilliard considered it constitutional. All agreed that it was very rare. A poll of those present resulted in an estimate of twenty-six in the previous ten years.

Pseudo-enteritis: Dr. Walter Allen reported a case of pseudo-enteritis

which had passed thirty feet of membrane. He considered it a kind of neoplasm.

Placenta previa: Dr. J. J. Allen reported a case of placenta previa, the second case in twenty years.

Convulsions in children. Discussing the question of convulsions in children, Dr. J. J. Scott offered morphine, gelsemium and veratrum viride as the drugs of choice.

Compound fracture—1886: Upon Dr. J. W. Allen reporting a case of compound fracture, Dr. Ashton ventured the opinion that antiseptics (alcohol and bichloride) would prevent suppuration. Furthermore, that while the weight of opinion was on the side of antiseptics, attention to cleanliness was an important factor to be considered. To quote him: "If Lister had done no more than call attention to this feature, he would have done much for surgery." "Most great men believe in antiseptics" Dr. Egan had treated with good results a similar fracture in a child before "the war" by extension and counter extension, using the head and foot boards of the bed. Dr. Lyon had used Buck's extension with good results.

Rubella or Rotheln, rubella sine catarrha, false measles: Dr. Billieu had seen his first case in December, 1885, again in January and February, 1886, after twenty years of practice. He differentiated it from measles and scarlet fever. Dr. Egan told of a severe epidemic of measles amongst the soldiers during the war and he knew these cases Dr. Billieu reported were not measles. Dr. T. J. Allen had seen his first case in 1862. (The name was proposed in 1866). The treatment agreed upon was the same as used for measles, viz.; liquid ammonii acetat, lemonade, aa tr iodine and glycerine for the throat. It was considered not fatal as a rule, although two cases had died from acute nephritis.

Whooping cough: Chloral hydrate and quinine were recommended for whooping cough.

Cancer: It was reported that Dr. J. C. Calhoun was suffering from cancer of the tongue and the Society voted him \$50.

Dr. T. J. Allen reported three cases of uterine cancer, one of which of cauliflower appearance, had been treated with injections of carbolic acid. Six weeks later it looked healthy and was soft to the touch. N. B.: All cancer specialists please take notice.

Perityphilitic abscess: Dr. J. C. Egan reported a case of perityphilitic abscess (appendicitis, of course) opened and drained on Dec. 9, 1886. He described in minutia how he had found the pus. He had done a so-called Buck's operation. Patient recovered.

Asiatic cholera: Dr. Fisher read a paper on Asiatic cholera. Dr. Tom Allen had seen his first cases in 1865 and later in 1867, whereupon Dr. Egan reported that his first case was a young man in Piedmont, Virginia, in 1849. Calomel, morphine, astringents, capsicum were the drugs recommended. Upon being interrogated by Dr. T. J. Allen, Dr. Hilliard promptly declared himself a thorough convert to the microbic theory of the disease. He believed it followed the line of travel and commerce, and was favored by the velocity and direction of the winds. He believed in the doctrine of contagion and thought that cleanliness and disinfection the best prophylaxis.

Dr. J. W. Allen reported a case to which he had been called. The man was unconscious, pulse 80, head and eyes to the left, convulsions. "I administered chloroform and advised that his regular physician be called. The doctor soon arrived, and after examination we retired for consultation, when we were suddenly called

back. Chloroform was again administered, and eight ozs. of blood (although now out of vogue) were withdrawn."

Gunshot wounds of the abdomen: In a discussion on gunshot wounds of the abdomen by Dr. J. W. Allen in 1887, Hunter McGuire was quoted as advocating the exploration of all such wounds by opening the abdomen. **There was almost unanimous dissent.**

Some accidental poison cases: Dr. Lyons reported that a big Irishman took 25 gtt. tr. aconite (regular dose 3 gtt.), profuse sweating and drop in temperature. Husband gave his wife 25 gtt. carbolic acid. Lard and emetics used with recovery.

Dr. Ford reported that a lady took a dram of phenol. Ipecac used with favorable results.

Dr. J. W. Allen reported that a child three years old had taken ½ dram chloroform and recovered.

Dr. Ford reported 3 drams Fowler's Solution taken by a drunk. Sesquioxid of iron and emetics used with recovery. Dr. Scott reported that a chicken ate strychnine, a man ate the chicken, the man developed convulsions, the chicken suffered no ill effects.

Congestion: In 1889 Dr. Lyon read a paper on congestion. He ridiculed the term and said there was no such term in the text books. Hilliard, Allen, Ashton and Yoakum then entered into the discussion and were of the opinion that malaria poison caused congestion and death. Dr. Hunt who had only the year previously been admitted to the society, very learnedly interpreted fever as a depression of the motor centers, the chill as a depression of the trophic centers. Dr. T. J. Allen interrupted at this point to ask the cause of malaria. "Simply the introduction of the bacillus malaria into the blood" answered Dr. Hunt who was

never at a loss for an answer. I might add by way of parenthesis that Laveran reported the discovery of the plasmodium in 1880.

Fracture of femur—caused by gunshot wound: Upon Dr. Hunt's reporting a fracture of the femur caused by a gunshot wound treated by the La Place method and Charpin Solution, and 1-1000 Hgcl. which resulted in one-eighth inch shortening, Dr. T. J. Allen was amazed at his results.

Dr. Egan then proceeded to give his experience as an army surgeon in Virginia when some very serious gunshot wounds and fractures were treated conservatively with success. One individual who pleaded for his leg which was about to be amputated lived to rejoin his regiment.

Dr. Lyon then reported a case of a man shot at Chancellorsville who was not operated upon because it was too high for amputation. He too recovered and rejoined his outfit. This brought to Dr. J. J. Scott's mind a case of a negro boy shot in the center of the forehead. The wound was not probed and the boy recovered. It was the consensus of opinion that the bullet had dropped into one of the frontal sinuses.

Puerperal septicemia—1890: Dr. Lyons reported a case of a primipara, thirty years old, normal labor (14 hours). Forty-eight hours following birth of the child she developed acute pain in the uterus. Temperature ranged from 100-104 F., Pulse 120-140. No arrest of lochia, no foul odor. Treatment—warm poultices to abdomen, morphine. "Warm carbolic vaginal douches were used from the very first as a prophylactic measure" (He was very careful to state this). "The chief, and I might say the only thing complained of after the initial uterine pain, was an uneasy feeling in the stomach and vomiting. She was hopeful and cheerful from the beginning, but the continued high pulse, coupled with progressive palor and

shrinkage of countenance and the peculiar so-called hippocratic cast continued unabated." "On the second day I irrigated the uterus with ¼M bichloride, the fountain syringe hanging on the bed post. The next day I repeated the irrigation using carbolic acid. For symptomatic treatment I relied upon quinine, and antipyrin by enema cautiously administered as indicated. Bismuth, lime water, sodium bicarbonate, cerium oxalate and mustard plasters had no effect on the vomiting. On the 6th day, in spite of the energetic treatment, the patient collapsed and died that evening."

Dr. T. J. Allen opined that a slight laceration was probably the point of infection. He **depreciated uterine irrigations**, saying they were sometimes dangerous and believed that the time was not far distant when they would not be as popular as they are at the present and have been in the past.

Puerperal Eclampsia: Dr. Melanson discussed puerperal eclampsia and advocated chloral hydrate and chloroform for convulsions. He opposed forcible labor.

Dr. T. J. Allen was doubtful of the kidney theory as the causation of convulsion. He believed in bleeding and rapid delivery.

Dr. Hunt believed death was due to asphyxia caused by anemia of the brain and suggested the use of brandy. He believed that pressure of the womb on the ureters caused retention of urine and poisoning of the system.

Dr. Yoakum favored veratrum viride and rapid delivery.

Dr. J. W. Allen related a case of a negro in the country to whom he was called, and having nothing else administered 10 grs. antipyrin by needle. This was repeated every 8 to 10 hours with beneficial results. Following that case he used the treatment several times with marked success.

Dr. Coty had had the same experience. Dr. Lyon did not believe that the speedy evacuation of the uterus was demanded as he had witnessed the convulsions postpartum.

Hepatic Phlebotomy: Dr. O'Leary discussed the treatment for congestion of the liver by removing blood from the liver with trochar and cannula. This was evidently a very live subject as Drs. Allen and Allen, Scott, Yoakum, and Lyon joined in the discussion and thought the treatment good. Dr. Lyon told the meeting that he had even aspirated the bladder and the colon.

Case report: Dr. Abney, a rural visitor reported that a negro had been brought to him with his bowels sticking out of a knife wound of the abdomen, all covered with dirt and wrapped in a dirty cloth. The bowel was also cut. He had stitched the wound in the bowel, returned it to the abdomen after thorough irrigation and sewed up the abdominal wall. No antiseptics were used. The negro was up and about on the 10th day thereafter.

Note: After this it was moved and duly seconded that the Secretary be instructed to write the Secretary of the State Med. Society asking for postponement of the State meeting. I thought at first that after hearing Dr. Abney, they considered the meeting superfluous, but later I learned it was on account of the "overflow."

1890—Empyema: Dr. J. W. Allen reported that the patient came to the hospital with a diagnosis of T. B. He obtained a gallon of pus by aspiration after which he inserted a drainage tube.

Alcohol: Dr. Yoakum reading a paper on alcohol declared that it was an anesthetic and depressant and not a stimulant. Dr. Lyon declared that his experience taught him otherwise. Dr. T. J. Allen agreed with Dr. Lyon and advocated alcohol in shock,

while Dr. Melanson spoke up and suggested **opium** as the most successful drug in shock.

1891—Gunshot wound: Dr. J. W. Allen reported a gunshot wound with the entrance of the bullet in the left side posterior, the exit near the right nipple. He reported that the bullet had pierced the liver, lung and diaphragm. The patient had vomited some blood. Dr. Lyon did not believe that the bullet had entered the liver as the patient was not jaundiced.

Progressive Muscular atrophy: Disseminating cerebral sclerosis: Dr. Allen reported a case of progressive muscular atrophy and a case of disseminating cerebral sclerosis. Both were improving rapidly under treatment. The drugs used were cod liver oil and Syr. Ferri Iodid.

Partial Dislocation of the lateral vertebra: A case of partial dislocation of the lateral vertebra was placed in a plaster of paris jacket. It was suggested that it was difficult to understand the condition unless it was due to caries of the spine. Dr. Allen reported that there was no history of scrofula and that the patient had a fair complexion.

Cystitis: A case of cystitis was treated with boric acid solution and agnos solution which had been continued until the "close of the scene."

Aneurism: Dr. Walter Allen reported an aneurism of the left buttocks the size of a derby hat. Treatment consisted in insertion of several large needles into the body of the tumor and left in situ. The patient refused ligation of the left iliac artery which he had proposed to do. Death occurred suddenly from rupture.

Nevus of the lip: A nevus of the lip, size of a chestnut, was injected with carbolic acid with negative results. This was done on the same principle as the injection treatment of hemorrhoids, reported Dr. Lyon.

Tetter: Dr. Yoakum had just cured a case of "tetter" on the hand of his own mother which had resisted treatment for thirty years. Treatment, ointment of chysorobin, ichthyol aa grs. xxiii. Salicylic acid grs. x, vaseline qs., applied b. i. d. for three weeks.

Puerperal fever: Dr. Scott reported a third case of puerperal fever treated with antipyrin. Dr. Lyons thought that some patients "got well in spite of the treatment."

Malignant diphtheria—1893: "Although the patient was treated by the most approved methods, death occurred."

Malaria hematuria: Dr. Terry's paper on malaria hematuria in which he considered alcohol a strong factor, quoting Sternberg, and syphilis and climate as strong predisposing factors, caused considerable discussion. A majority were opposed to the use of quinine except in intermittent fever. Drs. Ford, T. J. Allen and Griffith did not believe that alcohol played any part in the etiology of the condition as they had seen too many cases amongst women and children. Dr. T. J. Allen had seen his first case in 1862. The patient had suffered for two months previously with intermittent fever. He believed that it was a disease of the nervous system, the blood becoming disorganized, the detritus fills the uriferous tubules causing suppression of urine and death. He advocated diuretics, hot water and hot fermentations. Dr. Griffith treated his cases with quinine, but was unsuccessful until he gave the quinine in solution. He also advocated through emesis (ipecac and ammonium tartrate, repeated at appropriate intervals). Dr. Allen interrupted to ask "Would you use cathartics in congestion of the bowels?" Dr. Griffith did not think the cases parallel. "Whereupon some little parrying ensued but without a definite conclusion."

Dr. Schumpert used quinine and crowded it until the "iris" dilated and would not respond to eserin.

Dr. Lyon did not think that any specific treatment in this or any other kindred affection should be considered. "We must be governed in the main," said he, "by existing conditions in the selection and application of remedies." To quote him further, "The discoloration of the skin is not due to bile from a congested liver but is due to the biliverdin from disorganized blood."

Dr. Egan used mercurial purges and diuretics (uva, ursae, hyoscyamus) and tr. ferri chlorid. He said that the blood may or may not be broken down. He had seen pure blood in the urine.

Syphilis due to hypodermic injection: Dr. Allen reported a case of syphilis due to a hypodermic injection. Whereupon there was quite a discussion as to the best means of keeping the needles aseptic. Unfortunately the details of the discussion are not recorded.

1893—Leg ulcers and skin grafting: In July Dr. Schumpert read a paper on leg ulcers and skin grafting. He treated the ulcer with zinc sulfat (50 grs. to oz.), agno, (40 grs. to oz.), peroxide of hydrogen and I-3M. Hgcl. Indurated edges from old advanced ulcers should be removed with the knife. With the ulcers level and aseptic small or large grafts may be used. The skin from which the grafts are obtained is cleansed with antiseptics and **vitalized** by friction before removal. The grafts are covered with rubber.

Then the question of whether or not black skin would grow in white skin was discussed. Riverden was quoted as saying that it could not. Dr. Allen, J. W., said that it could and that black skin on a white person would lose the pigment and become white.

Etiology of diabetes mellitus: Dr. Randall Hunt read a very learned paper on the "Etiology of Diabetes Mellitus." The seat of the disease was in the fourth ventricle, said he. Polyuria was due to irritation of the sympathetic nerves, nausea and indigestion to irritation of the gastric nerves. The **pancreas** was also involved and played an important part. Pot. iodid was the treatment of choice. He explained the K I treatment as follows: "Inflammation of the 4th ventricle produces a low grade tissue which attacks nerves at its roots. K. I. by resolution corrects this. It was news to Dr. Griffith that the pancreas was involved in diabetes mellitus. Dr. Ford suggested that with the important advances in our knowledge of the disease, treatment was not so formative as in the past. Dr. J. W. Allen said sulfonal would reduce the amount of sugar, while old Dr. T. J. Allen believed that diet was the most beneficial form of treatment for the disease.

Pernicious anemia: Dr. Schumpert reported a case with parietic symptoms which he named pernicious anemia. There was incontinence of bowels and bladder, ataxic gait. The parts affected he said were the cervical, lumbar, and sacral segments of the cord. The dorsal segment had been spared. The patient was presented to the Society and after examining him it was the general opinion of the members present that the patient had locomotor ataxia. Whereupon a spirited discussion arose. When it was suggested by Dr. Schumpert that there was no history of syphilis, Hunt, quoting Charcot, said that all cases of locomotor ataxia were due to syphilis. He himself had a case where the unsuspected chancre was located in the roof of the mouth. Dr. T. J. Allen recommended strychnine and ferri phosphat; Dr. Hunt advocated electricity. Neither Dr. Lyon nor Dr. Griffith had ever seen any benefits from the use of electricity. Dr. Hunt suggested that

they probably did not understand its use. He then proceeded to tell the Society that galvanic and faradic currents produced opposite effects, viz: galvanic is a resolvent and stops degeneration and hence is useful in locomotor ataxis. The faradic current is a tonic and increases muscular tissue activity and is not indicated in this affection, a "disease of degenerative metamorphosis", Dr. Vance concurs with Dr. Hunt.

In reviewing these records, many of the discussions have been omitted and perhaps some of lagging interest inserted. I have attempted to draw a picture of the times; and to me no

better illustrations of that period could be clearer to the reader's mind than the thoughts of the actors expressed in their own words. Therefore, I have lifted, so to speak, the records from the minutes as they were written down by the secretary, only adding my own comment from time to time that I might weave the parts together.

If I have succeeded in presenting a most interesting and valuable historical document to my readers in entertaining form I am amply rewarded; if I have failed I can only crave your indulgence.

(Copy of letter written by Dr. Bartholomew Egan and sent by his son, Dr. James C. Egan, to a convention of physicians held in Shreveport, November 14, 1855.)

Mt. Lebanon, Bienville Parish, La.
November 12, 1855

To the Physicians convened at
Shreveport,

Gentlemen:-

I regret that it is out of my power to be present with you in your deliberations on the 14th inst. I send however a diploma which I prize the more highly as it was the first honorary diploma conferred by the Hampden Sidney Medical College located at Richmond, Virginia, whose habit it is to select occasionally in the different districts of the State some physician of reputation as the recipient of such marked distinction. And, in the event of your organizing a Medical Society, I ask to be admitted as a member of that body. I am convinced that such an organization, judiciously managed, must tend to improve and elevate the character of our profession in North Louisiana.

The country practitioners, however well prepared at first to enter upon his duties, wanting the stimulus of mental collision with his superiors in knowledge, is in danger of resting mainly on the acquirements of his youth, of ceasing to pursue his professional studies as a science, and too often contents himself with a superficial reading of medical journals and an occasional reference to standard authors. In time he becomes a routine practitioner, guided by the lights of false experience, confident amidst blunders, dogmatic and self-satisfied. To this class there are many honorable exceptions. I speak only of tendencies.

On the other hand, the conscientious physician who places a proper estimate on the dignity of his profession and the value of human life, has, in country practice, facilities for minute and accurate observation not ordinarily enjoyed in city practice. He is at once physician and nurse. He prepares, administers and watches the effect of each medicinal agent prescribed. His patient is often his neighbor and friend

in whose welfare he feels an anxious and intense interest, and every effort of the doctor's skill is exerted for his recovery. If these efforts are guided by sound judgment, and a proper knowledge of the principles of medical science, he is ordinarily more successful than men of much greater ability in city practice.

Each region, too, has its own endemic diseases, or, at least characteristics of disease, and, if he is a close and enlightened observer, the country practitioner will soon classify for himself these peculiar features of disease and ascertain with accuracy the most appropriate treatment.

The association which it is your purpose to form will cause its members to read more systematically, to observe more minutely, and, above all, to record and generalize their observations. It will stimulate with a generous ambition to excel, and enrich all with the fruits of the reflections and the experience of each. In its moral aspect it will bring into pleasant and kindly association brethren of the same profession who may otherwise remain strangers to each other. It will smooth asperities which may spring from conflicting interests and do much to throw out of the pale of the profession a large class of empirics who usually crowd into newly settled districts.

There are, it is true, in every country occasional instances of men endowed with vigorous intellects and admirable powers of observation, who, having commenced the practice of medicine without the ordinary prerequisite of a diploma, have, nevertheless, become shining lights of the profession. If any such be found, they, of course, would not be excluded from participating in your deliberations and aiding in your counsels.

Dr. Bartholomew Egan

(Compiled by Miss Lavinia Egan, granddaughter of Dr. B. Egan, and daughter of Dr. Jas. Egan, from family papers in her possession.)

Dr. Bartholomew Egan, founder of the Egan family in Louisiana, and elder of the two doctors Egan whose distinguished service contributed so largely to the medical history of the State, was a native of Killarney, Ireland, where he was born in 1795, the fourth of seven sons of James Constantine Egan and Jane Bradshaw, his wife.

The Egans were an ancient and honorable family, having been hereditary Brehons, or judges, maintained at the courts of the chieftains of Ireland since the earliest days of her history. Originally possessed of extensive estates in Tipperary and Galway within which localities they maintained, in olden times, handsome castles, their wealth, like that of other Catholic families, was swept away and their lands confiscated under the various penal laws that afflicted Ireland throughout so long a period of her remarkable history, and, at the time of Dr. Egan's birth, his father, a highly educated classical scholar, was a teacher of note residing with his family in a two-story stone house on the north side of High Street in the picturesque town of Killarney.

After graduating at Trinity College, Dublin, Bartholomew Egan began to fit himself for the priesthood, but, abandoning that idea, he was married, at the age of twenty-one to Ann Eliza Cormick, talented daughter of General John Cormick, who, having been exiled for participation in the revolution of 1798, exchanged clothes with his gardener, and, thus disguised, fled to France, later emigrating to America in company with his brother, Joseph Cormick, Dr. McClellan, the father of General George B. McClellan, and Dr. Thomas Addis Emmet, the brother of Robert Emmet.

In 1817, Bartholomew Egan with his wife, came to the United States, locating in Amelia County, Virginia, near

the "Wigwam," the home of Governor William B. Giles, with whom Dr. Egan was on terms of the warmest intimacy throughout his life. Here he became an instructor of the classical languages at Amelia Academy, an institution founded by Governor Giles, and, during this period began the study of medicine, receiving his degree from Richmond Medical College.

The residence as a practicing physician in various sections of Virginia which continued over a period of thirty years, was rich in experience for the ardent and talented young Irishman. At the beginning of this period, the Sage of Monticello was formulating his plans for the founding of the University at Charlottesville, and it is little wonder that the great Jefferson found in the abilities and enthusiasm of the young Irishman, fresh from old Trinity, so real a help and inspiration in carrying out the undertaking dear to his heart, and it is related that he declared Egan to be "the ripest scholar of his age" that had ever come within his acquaintance.

Brought into terms of intellectual intimacy with Jefferson, Madison, Giles and others, living on terms of neighborliness and practicing his profession in such families of the Old Dominion as the Henrys, Dandridges, Perkinses, Martins, Dillardes, Gravelys, Talliaferros and the like, it is small wonder that Dr. Egan became thoroughly imbued with the spirit of democracy that animated the times and the section. So we find him at this time, both in print and on the rostrums, espousing the cause of political and religious liberty, and, in his own life attesting his liberation of conscience by renouncing Catholicism and uniting with the Baptist church. This church, then as now so strong in Virginia, was at that time conspicuous by reason of the part it had played in

influencing the "religious liberty clause" which came to be written both into the constitution of the State of Virginia and the constitution of the United States.

The gradually failing health of Mrs. Egan led Dr. Egan to seek a home for her in a less rigorous climate, and, having been attracted by an article in DeBow's Review, describing the vine-clad hills of north Louisiana, in the year 1847, Dr. Egan set out alone and on horseback seeking a new home in what was then but a western wilderness. Learning, as he journeyed through the Carolinas, of a community recently established in north Louisiana by a group of wealthy South Carolina planters who, seeking more land for their slaves to cultivate and wider opportunities for their growing families, had founded the village of Mt. Lebanon in what was then a part of Claiborne Parish,—later Bienville—erected comfortable homes, built a church and established schools, Dr. Egan determined to visit the locality. It was here, then, in the recently established village of Mt. Lebanon, in the midst of a wilderness, but surrounded by a group of wealthy and cultured pioneer families, that Dr. Egan began his distinguished career in Louisiana. Here he resided for nearly fifty years practicing his profession for the greater part of that time, patients journeying across swamps and bayous from the remote sections of the State to receive his treatment.

"Erinville," the home which he built here, and where he and his talented wife mixed Old World culture with New World democracy, and Irish wit and classic learning lent charm and piquancy to hospitable gatherings that have been woven into the tradition of the section, soon became the Mecca for the intellectuals of the entire State. Scarcely a person of note visited north Louisiana during the middle years of the Nineteenth Century who was not entertained at "Erinville" and who has not left some token of appreciation in

the form of a letter to the "old Doctor" of Madame Egan.

Though continuing the practice of his profession, Dr. Egan participated unceasingly in the educational and religious activities of the community. In 1853, largely through his efforts, the Louisiana University, later, the Mt. Lebanon Baptist College, was founded in the village, Dr. Egan serving as president of the institution for several years and entirely without pay. At his instigation, and under rules of order drawn up by him, the Louisiana Baptist State Convention was organized in the village church. He was instrumental in organizing and became the president of the North Louisiana Medical Society.

Dr. Egan's Civil War service is noteworthy. He was one of the electors of Jefferson Davis as President of the Confederacy; he was Surgeon General of the State forces under Governor Moore; he was Superintendent of the State Laboratory establishment at Mt. Lebanon, the buildings and grounds of the Female College at this place being purchased for this purpose, and medicines for use of the Louisiana soldiers being manufactured here under Dr. Egan's direction.

Dr. and Mrs. Egan had but two children, both sons and both born in Virginia and growing to manhood there. Both followed their parents to Louisiana and both attained distinction in this State, one the well-known Dr. James Cronan Egan of Shreveport the other, Judge William B. Giles Egan, Associate Justice of the Supreme Bench.

Of Dr. Egan's six brothers, four followed him to America, one dying early, the other three attained prominence; one, Dr. William Bradshaw Egan, a pioneer physician, politician and city-planner of Chicago; another Dr. Charles Egan of Blue Mound Illinois; and a third, the Hon. Danie Egan, who attained wealth and distinction at Port Gibson, Mississippi, and whose only son removed to Louisiana

in early manhood. It was this nephew of Dr. Bartholomew Egan's, namely, Judge James Constantine Egan of Coushatta, who was Attorney General of the State under the Wiltz administration, and who made the fourth of the quartette of Egan's who have

rendered distinguished service to the state of Louisiana.

Dr. Bartholomew Egan survived his wife by several years, dying at the home of his son, Dr. J. C. Egan, in Shreveport, at the ripe old age of eighty-six.

The Shreveport Medical Society was reorganized in 1876, but the members assembled in regular session only twice in the succeeding six years. The officers, whose terms expired in December, 1883, were Dr. A. A. Lyon, president; J. J. Scott, vice-president; J. W. Allen, recorder; T. J. Allen, correspondent, and W. L. Egan, treasurer.

Woman's Auxiliary to Shreveport Medical Society

The Woman's Auxiliary to the Shreveport Medical Society was organized January 27, 1928, through the efforts of Mrs. S. A. Collom, Sr. of Texarkana. Its first officers were Mrs. A. A. Herold, president; Mrs. C. R. Gowen; first vice-president; Mrs. M. S. Picard, second vice-president; Mrs. J. M. Bodenheimer, third vice-president; Mrs. B. C. Garrett, fourth vice-president; Mrs. S. W. Boyce, recording secretary; Mrs. R. T. Lucas, corresponding secretary; Mrs. C. H. Hamner, publicity secretary; Mrs. L. W. Gorton, treasurer; Mrs. A. J. Thomas, parliamentarian.

This organization has grown in size, popularity and work, so that it is truly an aid to the doctors of the community and the Medical Society. Among its benefactions is assistance in the annual Christmas Seal sale for the Tuberculosis Society and also takes part in any other

worthwhile endeavors, including education of the public as to the necessity of combatting moves for compulsory government insurance. Among the meritorious projects, which this organization has undertaken, is cooperation with the local branch of the American Cancer Society; the Auxiliary maintains a well attended work group which makes dressings for cancer patients, not only in Shreveport and Caddo Parish, but also for aid in other parts of the state. The present membership is 140.

This was the first auxiliary organized in Louisiana and the Louisiana State Auxiliary was formed in 1929, as a result of the efforts of one of the members of the Shreveport organization, Mrs. A. A. Herold, assisted by her husband, who was the retiring president of the State Society.

CHAPTER 7

Hospitals of Shreveport

SHREVEPORT CHARITY HOSPITAL

Prior to the establishment of the Shreveport Charity Hospital in Shreveport, which was provided for by an act of the legislature in 1876, the United States government had operated a marine hospital here for several years. There is no authentic record of its activities. It appears to have been established here about 1865, and is believed to have been located on the hill where the Hamilton Terrace junior high school now is.

Whether or not the Marine hospital was maintained wholly by the federal government, or received aid from the State and the parish, is not definitely known, although some of the records appear to indicate that such was the case. The Marine hospital appears to have been operating in a small way during the yellow fever epidemic of 1873. There is no record of its activities after that year.

The first steps toward the establishment of a State maintained hospital in Shreveport was taken at the 1876 meeting of the State legislature when an appropriation of \$10,000 per year was made for that purpose.

Following the passage of the act the governor appointed as the first board of directors, Capt. Simon Levy, Jr., W. P. Ford, Pete J. Trezevant, Mayor N. W. Murphy and J. B. Smith, the latter serving as President of the parish police jury at the time.

With the money appropriated by the legislature, the board of directors took over a group of log and frame buildings located at a point about where Ford street now crosses Pierre avenue. The buildings had been formerly used by the Rev. J. Franklin Ford as a private school, and the location was known as Moss Side Park.

Dr. T. G. Ford, father of Finance Commissioner John McW. Ford, was appointed chief surgeon, Dr. W. M. Turner was superintendent, and W. K. Sutherlin was intern.

No further record of the activities of the institution from the time of its founding until 1882 are available, but at the meeting of the State legislature that year an appropriation of \$20,000 was made to buy a new site for the hospital, and the present site on Texas Avenue, consisting of four acres, was purchased for \$1,200. This part of the city was then known as the "Mugginsville" settlement. This four-acre tract is now appraised at more than \$250,000 without the buildings.

A new hospital on this site was not completed until 1889. It was of frame construction, 215 feet long, 38 feet wide and two stories high. It was a rather pretentious structure for that period. The new hospital was formally opened August 8, 1889, with Dr. D. M. Clay as chief surgeon in charge; a Mrs. Tabor as matron and Dr. F. S. Furman as intern.

The following year, 1890, Dr. J. W. Allen succeeded Dr. Clay as chief surgeon, I. M. Calloway became superintendent. Their salaries were fixed at \$75 and \$25 per month, respectively. A short time later H. J. Parsons succeeded Calloway as superintendent.

In 1892, the board of directors limited the hospital to \$600 per month for maintenance, and in 1893 Dr. T. E. Schumpert became chief surgeon at \$80 per month. Shortly afterwards he was also made superintendent and given quarters in the building, but his salary was reduced to \$75 per month.

Under Dr. Schumpert's administration a number of improvements were made and additional facilities provided, the first being a water closet and

bath room for the house officers, installed in 1894. Ladders and buckets also were provided for use in case of fire.

In 1898, Dr. R. H. Gray was elected surgeon in charge and an operating room was provided, built of brick. During this same year the city built a pest house on the hospital grounds at a cost of \$265 and sent the bill to the hospital board. An assistant cook for the hospital, a Mrs. Casey, was employed at \$4 per month.

In 1898, Dr. R. H. Gray was elected surgeon in charge and Dr. I. M. Calloway returned as assistant. The records show that at that time the hospital secured milk at 15 cents per gallon, coffins for hospital patients at \$1.50 each, including head and foot boards and transportation to cemetery; meat was purchased at 5 cents per pound.

In 1899, the hospital was screened and a trained nurse, a Miss Williams, was employed at \$30 per month. She asked for a raise to \$50 and another nurse took her place at \$40 per month.

In 1900, Dr. Randell Hunt became surgeon in chief and Dr. Calloway continued as superintendent. Plans for establishing a school for nurses were first considered at this time.

A new building was erected in 1903 at a cost of approximately \$80,000, and for the first time a telephone was placed in the hospital.

The following year, 1904, Dr. Randell Hunt returned as surgeon in charge, with Dr. W. M. Ledbetter as assistant surgeon and superintendent. A training school for nurses was established during this period. The institution was now experiencing a fast growing demand for hospital service. During the two years previous to May 1, 1904, 4,946 patients had been treated, with a gross mortality of 7.1 per cent. There were 825 operations with a mortality of 5 per cent. Increasing demands upon the institution necessitated a larger staff, and in December, 1908, Dr. G. B. Lawrason became chief surgeon;

Dr. I. M. Calloway was named superintendent; Dr. A. A. Herold was added to the staff as assistant surgeon and pathologist, and Dr. Oscar Dowling was made chief of eye, ear, nose and throat work.

In 1912, Dr. E. A. Welsh took Dr. Herold's place and Dr. A. P. Crain succeeded Dr. Lawrason as chief surgeon. Dr. S. L. Williams became assistant surgeon and superintendent.

In 1916, Dr. J. A. Hendrick was appointed chief surgeon and Dr. Chas. E. Rew became assistant surgeon and superintendent. Upon the resignation of Dr. Hendrick a few months later, Dr. Rew took charge and continued at the head of the institution until 1920, when he was succeeded by Dr. W. P. Morrill. He continued as superintendent for the next four years.

In 1924, Dr. J. M. Mosely was appointed superintendent, serving until June 1, 1928, when he was succeeded by Dr. E. L. Sanderson as superintendent and chief surgeon, with Dr. Geo. Robinson as senior resident surgeon, Dr. John Couret as junior resident surgeon, and Dr. W. R. Mathews as pathologist.

During Dr. Mosely's administration the Nurses Home, kitchen, interns' quarters and power plant were built, and the back part of the hospital fire-proofed.

Many improvements have been made and the hospital building considerably enlarged since Dr. Sanderson took charge in 1928. The Shreveport Charity Hospital now ranks as one of the finest in the Southwest. It is provided with every modern facility, operating pavilions, laboratories, admitting ward, X-ray equipment, laundry, morgue, ball court, orthopedic wards, obstetrical department, children's department, children's dream ward, call system for doctors and supervisors, nurses' home, and other modern conveniences. The hospital grounds are surrounded by an ornamental iron fence and beautiful evergreens about the building add to the general magnificence.

During Dr. Sanderson's administration, since June 1, 1928, when the institution had 196 beds, to the present time, the remainder of the hospital has been fireproofed and modernized with new additional wings on the north and south ends, until now the hospital has 800 beds.

The Shreveport Charity Hospital is now rated A-1 by the American Medical Association and the American College of Surgeons.

The Tumor clinic, which is a part of the institution, is the first of its kind in the State and is rated high nationally.

With the change of State administrations, Dr. Sanderson retired from the position of superintendent and was succeeded by Dr. Edgar Galloway, who served eight years and who, in turn with political fortunes, was retired and was succeeded by Dr. W. E. Reid, who has previously been conducting a private hospital in Leesville.

Under Dr. Reid's administration, the Charity Hospital has taken over "The Pines" Tuberculosis Hospital and has started the erection of a modern up-to-date new building on King's Highway.

HIGHLAND SANITARIUM

The Highland Sanitarium and Clinic was established in 1917 by Drs. T. P. Lloyd, J. A. Hendrick and H. J. Parsons. It is located on a high plateau of five acres at the corner of Marshall and Highland.

It has, in connection, a large clinic, housed in an adjoining building and, in the rear, is a large nurses' home. At the present, the owners are Dr. T. P. Lloyd and Dr. J. A. Hendrick, Jr., one being a founder and the other the son of one of the other founders.

NORTH LOUISIANA SANITARIUM

The North Louisiana Sanitarium was founded in 1907 by Dr. Louis Abramson. For a number of years it was operated in the 700 block of Crockett

street. The sanitarium is modern in every respect and equipped with every facility.

In 1917, Dr. A. A. Herold became a stockholder, but he was not a full partner until he and the founder, Dr. Abramson, jointly erected the modern, fireproof building on Hamilton Terrace, Louisiana Avenue. Since Dr. Louis Abramson's death, Dr. Paul D. Abramson, his son, has been actively connected with the management and, under his supervision, the elaborate clinic building was erected and it is connected with the hospital building.

At present, Dr. Herold is president, Dr. Abramson, vice-president and Herman L. Herold secretary-treasurer and hospital administrator.

PHYSICIANS AND SURGEONS HOSPITAL

This building, completed by Dr. J. R. Stamper, in 1947, is situated on a plot of ground which also includes the Physicians & Surgeons Building, which houses many doctors' offices. It is conducted by the Magnolia Building Company, of which Dr. Stamper is President, Miss Elinor Stamper is Vice-President and Dr. T. J. Smith is Secretary.

T. E. SCHUMPERT MEMORIAL SANITARIUM

Dr. T. E. Schumpert, who had served for five years as chief surgeon of Charity Hospital, opened a private hospital, sometime about 1898, in the old frame building at the corner of Milam and Edwards streets on the site now occupied by the Gardner Hotel; this building had been originally erected as a Y. M. C. A. and, later, was used for several years, by the Shreveport High School. After a short tenure in this location, he obtained the property at the corner of Grand and Texas Avenues, now occupied by Andress Motor Co.; this had formerly been the Kate P. Nelson School for girls. Dr.

Schumpert actively managed this institution for a few years, later turning it over to Drs. J. C. Willis and Louis Abramson, who conducted it until the latter erected his own hospital and the former withdrew to form a new medical and surgical partnership; at this time, Dr. Schumpert turned over the management to the Sisters of Charity.

This Sanitarium, located on the west side of Margaret Place, just a short distance from Fairfield avenue, and on one of the highest plateaus in the city, is now owned and operated by the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word. The Mother House of the order is now located at Houston, Texas.

About one year before the death of Dr. Schumpert, May 16, 1908, he had turned over to the Sisters his large sanitarium. During his brief illness he made a will bequeathing the property to the Sisters with the provision that they should establish the T. E. Schumpert Memorial Sanitarium.

Due to legal technicalities Dr. Schumpert's will was declared null and void by the courts and the property turned over to Dr. Schumpert's father, his only surviving relative. Desiring to carry out the wishes of his son, Dr. Schumpert yielded the property to the Sisters.

In May, 1909, the Sisters purchased the present sanitarium site and soon thereafter erected the present fine building as a memorial to their benefactor, thus carrying out the provisions expressed in his will.

TRI-STATE HOSPITAL

It was erected in 1926 by the late Drs. L. H. Pirkle and T. E. Williams, who conducted it for two years, selling out to Drs. J. E. Knighton and the late Dr. J. C. Willis, Sr. in 1928; these latter erected a clinic building, adjoining and connecting, for the "Willis-Knighton Clinic", which had previously been organized. Dr. J. E. Knighton, Sr. is still actively connected with this institution, as are Dr. J. C. Willis, Jr., Dr. W. S. Kerfin, Dr. T. E. Strain and other associates.

TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITALS

"THE PINES"

This institution, started in a very primitive way, in 1914, by a group of right-thinking and charitable women of Shreveport, headed by Mrs. Meyer Benson, grew to great proportions and has not only saved many lives, but has been the biggest factor in this community in the near eradication of tuberculosis and tuberculous foci. Through the help of many public spirited men and women, notably J. B. Ardis, Judge J. C. Pugh, Mrs. Penny Ardis Mills and others, modern buildings were erected for both white and colored patients. However, with the heavy financial burden entailed in properly caring for the patients and keeping the buildings and equipment up-to-date, it was decided in November, 1948, as the state of Louisiana was willing to assume its obligation and take over the care and maintenance of these institutions, to turn the properties over to the state and the operation of them is now under the jurisdiction of the Charity Hospital Board and Superintendent with Dr. W. W. McCook, Jr. as surgeon-in-charge.

GILMER CHEST HOSPITAL

In 1939, Dr. P. R. Gilmer acquired possession of the Meyer Estate property on Hamilton Terrace and organized the Gilmer Chest Hospital, devoted to the medical and surgical treatment of chest diseases, tuberculosis and otherwise. The institution has prospered so that recent enlargements and improvements have become necessary. Dr. Gilmer has had several assistants, but the work there has been done essentially by him.

GOWEN SANATORIUM

In 1929, Dr. C. R. Gowen completed his tuberculosis sanatorium, located on a large plot of ground, just off the southern edge of Shreveport; it is of the cottage type, with one large central building, to which has been recently

added operating rooms and surgical treatment rooms. Besides Dr. Gowen, Dr. E. Clay Edwards and Dr. F. J. Philips, chest surgeon, comprise the staff.

SHRINE HOSPITAL FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN

Under the direction of El Karubah Temple the first Shrine Hospital for

Crippled Children in the United States was erected in Shreveport in 1922 at a cost of \$450,000.00. Accommodations are provided for 60 patients. The buildings are located at Kings Highway and Samford Place, and are fitted with every modern appliance known to surgery. Its service to crippled children has been invaluable.

Boards of Health, Sanitation and Epidemics

In 1876, Shreveport was anything but a clean and healthful city—with a population of more than 10,000, of whom 50 per cent were negroes, the streets were unpaved, the houses were unscreened, there was no sewerage and the supply of drinking water was inadequate.

The unpaved streets were unbelievably muddy in winter and unspeakably dusty in summer, according to one authority. There were several undrained swamps nearby, Silver Lake often having stagnant water and St. Paul's bottom reached up into what is now the very heart of the city. There were innumerable negro tenant houses built around these swamps, some of which were on stilts, so that the water flowed under them constantly, being reached by gangways or piers extending from dry land to the doorways.

These "quarters" were infested with diseases such as malaria and swamp fever, and the whole town was so annoyed with mosquitoes that beds were fitted with mosquito bars, and it is said that seamstresses and milliners worked under bars suspended from the ceiling.

It was impossible to have wells so near the river, so the source of water supply was rain water caught by each householder in cypress tanks, which were seldom covered or screened, or in concreted underground cisterns subject to contamination. Additional water needed for drinking or household purposes came from a large open spring, Currie's spring which was situated at about where Line Avenue, extending from Marshall street, cuts into Louisiana Avenue. This water was sold at five cents the bucketful by negroes who hawked it about the streets in two-wheel carts drawn by horses.

Add to these conditions the fact that large numbers of cattle pens existed on Cross bayou awaiting shipment to New Orleans by steamboat and also, that

the raft of decaying logs and debris above the city were again being loosened and broken up, and it is not difficult to understand the general health situation which prevailed around the 1870's.

One of the greatest disasters which every befell Shreveport was the Yellow Fever epidemic of 1873. There had been previous visitations of this disease, notably in 1869, but this was far the most disastrous in numbers and in fatalities among the prominent leaders of the city.

It was thought that a circus was responsible for bringing the disease, and that its virulence was augmented by the drowning of a boat load of cattle near the city. According to the report of the Howard Association there were 736 deaths at this time in the city alone, from August 20 to November 13, and many others in its environs.

Following the re-organization of the Shreveport Medical Association many city ordinances were passed as protective measures for health. Drainage, sewerage, installation of water supply, food inspection, vaccination all followed and kept pace with the rapidly growing population.

In 1878, the Louisiana State Medical Society was organized in New Orleans, eleven doctors being present from Shreveport. By 1895, legislation providing for a State Board of Medical examiners was passed. This board has done valuable service by preventing unqualified practitioners from entering the profession.

Under the State constitution of 1898, provisions were made for the establishment of State, Parish and Municipal Boards of Health adequate to control general conditions throughout the locality. The legislative measure enacted to put this program into effect was largely the work of Dr. James C. Egan of Shreveport and Dr. Edmund Souchon of New Orleans.

Since these days, with modern water and sewerage facilities and paved streets, Shreveport with its rapidly growing population has become one of the cleanest and most beautiful cities in the southwest; likewise, the entire parish of Caddo has been drained and paved to such an extent that communicable diseases have become less and less existent.

For many years, dating back before the present century, Dr. J. C. Egan was the City Health Officer; upon his death, Dr. T. E. Schumpert succeeded him, followed in turn by Drs. J. A. Blanchard, A. S. Reiser, Sr., A. A. Herold, Sr., G. C. Chandler, A. G. Heath, J. H. Cannon and J. W. Sandidge, who is at present, Director of Caddo-Shreveport Health Unit.

In 1912, a severe epidemic of meningococcic meningitis swept in from Texas and claimed many lives; the winter was cold and rainy, which seemed to favor its propagation and spread; it was finally eradicated by isolation, aided by warm weather.

In the fall of 1918 and early winter of 1919, a virulent form of influenza swept over the country, and there were many deaths in the city and parish therefrom; it seems that it was imported from Europe following World War I. To date, there has been no recurrence, but it is believed that, with modern medication, this disease could be better combatted today.

3. **THOMAS E. SCHUMPERT**, Shreveport: (1863-1908); M. D., Louisville Medical College, 1885; President in 1901, at 38 years of age; survived his presidency for 7 years; chief surgeon, Shreveport Charity Hospital and founder of the T. E. Schumpert Memorial Hospital, Shreveport.

4. **OSCAR DOWLING**, (1866-1930); M. D., Vanderbilt University, 1888; President in 1907, at the age of 42 years; has survived his presidency for 21 years; sanitation; visiting surgeon, Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital, 1896-1899; Professor of Public Health, Tulane Medical School since 1918; President of the Louisiana State Board of Health, 1910-1928.

5. **JAMES C. WILLIS**, Shreveport: (1865-1945; M. D., Vanderbilt University, 1887; President in 1915, at the age

of 50 years; has survived his presidency for 14 years; surgeon; chief surgeon of the T. E. Schumpert Hospital, Shreveport, for 20 years; chief surgeon, Charity Hospital of Shreveport, since 1920; and chief surgeon of the Tri-State Hospital, Shreveport, since 1928.

6. **JAMES E. KNIGHTON**, Shreveport, (1870-1950); M. D., University of Tennessee, 1899; President in 1921 at 51 years of age; has survived his presidency for 8 years; specialty, internal medicine, chief of the medical service, Charity Hospital, Shreveport, since 1920; now chief of medical service at the Tri-State Hospital, Shreveport.

7. **ARTHUR A. HEROLD**, Shreveport: (1882-); M. D., Tulane Medical School, 1907; President in 1927 at the age of 45 years; has survived his presidency 22 years; specialty, internal medicine; assistant surgeon and pathologist, Shreveport Charity Hospital, 1908-1912; coroner and health officer of Caddo Parish, 1912-1916; president and Chief of Medical Service of North Louisiana Sanitarium.

8. **SIDNEY C. BARROW**, Shreveport: (1876-1948); M. D., President in 1942 at age of 64; practice limited to radiology.

9. **MARION D. HARGROVE**, Shreveport: (1894-); M. D., Tulane, 1923. President in 1948 at age of 54; practice limited to internal medicine.

After the World War he specialized in Ear, Nose and Throat work, and was elected to the Surgical Staff in the Ear, Nose and Throat clinic of the Presbyterian Hospital, Baltimore, Maryland, later was appointed to a like responsible position at the service department at the St. Joseph's Hospital in the same City.

His general internship of 6 months was procured at the then Physicians and Surgeons College, which in 1916 joined hands as a part of the University of Maryland Medical Department.

In the winter of 1928 Dr. Robinson opened offices in Shreveport. He began the practice of specializing in Ear, Nose and Throat diseases, after leaving Baltimore as his home for so many years.

He resigned from active professional duties on November 16, 1936, but continued his residence in the City of Shreveport.

He was a member of the Tri-State and Shreveport Medical Societies, and the Louisiana State Medical Society. The Doctor's brothers were the late lamented, greatly beloved, good man, John M. Robinson, Sr. and the younger brother, Dr. George Willis Robinson, so highly esteemed by all who knew him. A pioneer of worth in his specialty of the Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat in Shreveport, La.

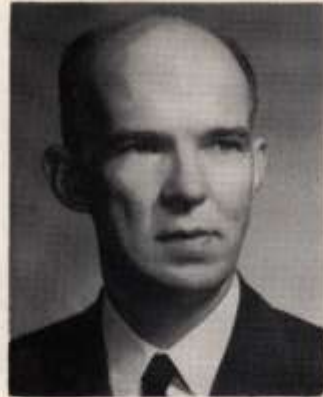
